***Impact of Electronic Knowledge Resources on Clinicians - Study participants needed!**

This study is funded by CIHR. We are now recruiting participants. Please write to roland.grad@mcgill.ca or pierre.pluye@mcgill.ca if interested. Investigators: GRAD, Roland M (co-PI) and PLUYE, Pierre (co-PI) DALKIR, Kimiz / HANLEY, James A / MACAULAY, Ann C / MARLOW, Bernard A - 40 family doctors will receive a new pocket PC PDA to search InfoRetriever, in particular for answers to their clinical questions. Participants will also use handheld software called Information Assessment Method (IAM). Using IAM, participants will evaluate their searches for a 1-year period. They will do this by indicating if each search was relevant, applied, and had positive or negative cognitive impact, choosing among statements like "I learned something new" or "I disagree with this information." If valid, IAM may help researchers to compare and evaluate the impact of clinical information. In addition, IAM may help authors to capture user feedback. The study will also explore the relationship between information that is pushed to clinicians on e-mail and then pulled at some later time. Incentives for participants include:

- 80% subsidy to buy a pocket PC phone, or 100% subsidy to buy a pocket PC PDA. We

are suggesting the htc 6300 (PDA, cell phone and camera). We will pay for all software e.g. 1-year subscription to InfoRetriever.

- Training to use IAM and InfoRetriever.
- Automatic tracking and reporting of M1 credits for InfoRetriever searches.
- Support - We will help to build a virtual community of practice for participants.

CIHR President Pierre Chartrand (V-P Research) has been appointed as Interim CIHR President, effective November 18, 2007. The CIHR President is appointed by the government and the search process will begin shortly. 2006 Open Operating Grant Competition-For fiscal management reasons, new operating grants will have a July 1, 2007 start-date rather than the normal October 1, 2007 date. The grants will end on June 30 in the final year, so careful financial management is essential to cover the final 3-month gap. The 26% budget cut imposed in the 2006 Open Operating Grant Competition has been reduced to 18%. The revised Authorizations for Funding (AFF) notices will be sent out in November with the funding adjustment retroactive to April 1, 2007.

September 2007 Competition-Approximately 2,100 grants were submitted for the September 2007 competition. It is anticipated that between 400-450 grants will be funded for a success rate of about 20%. There may also be approximately 75 1-year grants.

Equipment and Maintenance Funding-No funding will be available for equipment or maintenance grants alone, or within operating grants, however discussions of this issue are on-going.

Researcher on Call - The Canadian Health Services Research Foundation and the Quality Healthcare Network are proud to announce Researcher on Call, a series of conference calls for healthcare researchers and decision makers designed to accelerate improvements in healthcare. Researcher on Call is an interactive series that brings researchers and decision makers together on a common topic. Each call is designed to clarify the findings in the selected research or synthesis discussed; identify and illustrate actions that can be taken on the findings; and explore the issues and challenges in fully implementing the findings in various settings. The dialogue will help participants consider the implications of the research results for improving their practice. The first Researcher on Call teleconference will focus on healthy healthcare workplaces and is scheduled for October 30, 2007.
